#### Greenwich Hospital receives prestigious Pinnacle of Excellence and Guardian of Excellence awards

Greenwich Hospital has received two coveted awards from **Press Ganey** for consistently excelling in patient experience. GH received the **Pinnacle of Excellence Award in Patient Experience** for maintaining consistently high levels of excellence over multiple years in Outpatient Services (which consists of 38 individual departments). Plus, the Emergency Department for the first time received the **Guardian of Excellence Award in Patient Experience** for consistently performing in the top 5 percent for one year.

### **Greenwich Hospital earns five Women's Choice Awards**


Greenwich Hospital received five 2020 Women's Choice Awards, recognizing it as one of America's Best Hospitals for Breast Care, Cancer Care, Obstetrics, Bariatric Surgery and Stroke. The award places Greenwich within an elite network of hospitals committed to empowering women to make informed healthcare choices.

"These awards highlight our commitment to providing an extraordinary experience for women at every stage of their lives," said Norman Roth, president/CEO. Roth noted that 70 percent of all healthcare decisions are made by women, who often have influence over their spouses, children, parents and siblings.

For the seventh consecutive year, the Breast Center at Smilow Cancer Hospital's Care Center in Greenwich was named one of America's Best Breast Centers for meeting the highest standards of the National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers. The hospital also was recognized as one of America's Best Hospitals for Cancer Care. Also for a seventh straight year, GH was selected as one of America's Best Hospitals for Obstetrics. This is the only award recognizing excellence in obstetrics based on robust criteria that consider patient satisfaction and clinical excellence. In addition, GH was named as one of America's Best Hospitals for Bariatric Surgery for a fourth time and received a Women's Choice Award as one of America's Best Stroke Centers for a third year.


#### Celebrate the Holiday Spirit


Greenwich Hospital continues its holiday traditions!

#### Hospitals, community agencies work together to CHIP away at health issues



Kids in the Kitchen, an after-school program sponsored by Greenwich Hospital and the Boys & Girls Club of Greenwich, empowers youth to make healthy lifestyle choices to prevent obesity and associated health risks. In New York, Caritas of Port Chester distributed 100 pounds of personal hygiene products donated by GH employees to families in crisis. These are among the many programs to evolve from a community health needs assessment involving Greenwich Hospital, the Greenwich Community Health Improvement Partnership and the Council of Community Services in Westchester County, NY.

Every three years, all five Yale New Haven Health delivery networks join with similar alliances to complete assessments to identify health issues and factors called social determinants that impact health and well-being. The most common social determinants (in our region and nationwide) are related to food, transportation, mental health, housing and education. The assessments included "community conversations" with residents about how health issues and social determinants affect them personally.

#### Request for patient stories

"Understanding the health status of a community – and the multitude of factors that influence health – are important in identifying priorities for future planning and funding, existing strengths and assets to build on, and areas for further collaboration and coordination across our system, other organizations and community groups," said Nancy Hamson, YNHHS Community Health Improvement director.

Using data from the assessments, YNHHS and other organizations develop Community Health Improvement Plans (CHIPs) to address major unmet needs. Bridgeport Hospital developed a Mobile Food Pantry, while Yale New Haven Hospital partnered with a food pantry. Westerly Hospital contributed to Habitat for Humanity and Lawrence + Memorial Hospital supported a New London urban agriculture plan. While the assessments and CHIPs are specific to each region, Community Health Improvement is exploring ways to align efforts systemwide.
